MUSEUM NEWS: CHILDREN'S CRAFTS, LATES & NEW DISPLAYS

We had the most fantastic summer at Horsham Museum, welcoming more than 6,000 visitors in the months of June, July and August. The focal point of this Summer's programme was the children's crafts in which 507 children participated. The highlight for me was the final week 'Puppets of the Past' where children could put on a play with their creations. It was lovely having a front row seat to such imaginative theatre productions. Our Visitor Services Officer, Helen was the brains behind these crafts and she already has plans in place for the October half term including 'Straw-tacular' scarecrows and pine cone owls.



Another new venture has been the Friday Lates where the museum has been open until 8pm with live music and refreshments. These have been popular, and it is nice to offer the opportunity for people to enjoy the galleries and the beautiful gardens. I am working with other Council teams to expand upon this for a possible Christmas late and we will share on the website and social media when the date has been confirmed.

Our Frederick du Cane Godman exhibition is due to close at the end of September and all preparations are in place to return the items which have been on loan. The exhibition has been well received and it has been a joy to read the comments in the visitors' book, especially by those who knew his daughters, Eva and Edith through their involvement with the



Girl Guides. The exhibition space will next become a semi-permanent display called 'Horsham Now' which will look at Horsham's creativity from midcentury until today as well as the transformations that the town has undergone in that time. We are very excited to be working alongside the UK's largest games studio, Creative Assembly, who call Horsham home. They have shared with us details of the creative process of the gaming industry and will be lending equipment and artwork which shows how characters and landscapes are brought to life. We will also be bringing out more pop culture stories, like Horsham's links to Doctor Who and the Magic Roundabout.

We are very much looking forward to being able to reintroduce the toy displays, but in a new location beside reception. It will be an A-Z of History with a mix of toys and games, as well as displays which bring to life elements of Horsham's past. This will open on Saturday 16 December, just in time for the Christmas holidays. We are hoping to include some dressing up options so if you, or somebody you know is a dab hand at sewing then do get in touch as we are looking to recruit some new sewing volunteers.

As always, thank you for your continued support and I look forward to seeing you at the museum over the coming months.

However, do make a note of our next event which will be a Christmas Special - The History of Pantomime with Pete Allen on Wednesday 6th December. Pete's an experienced speaker on popular media topics so I hope that we can show him some good support when he visits.

Also, note that more coach trips are planned for

2024 - first to Ramster Gardens in May and then a second visit to Woolbeding in September. We had a marvellous afternoon at the latter in Spring, so I hope that members will continue to support such initiatives going forward.

On the business side, I'm delighted to announce that Ann Rattray has agreed to join the Committee and take over as the Friend's Secretary from November. Pam French and Audrey Coventry have been covering aspects of this role more recently, and will gently ease Ann into her new duties over the next few weeks. Ann is a key member of the Horsham Arts Society, and we'll learn more about her in our next issue. She is warmly welcomed.

At this stage, I would like to thank the other members of the Committee for their continued enthusiasm to drive our Group forward. Our process and organisation seems to work well and we are committed in our support for the Museum and to our members. As ever, we very much value the excellent working relationship that we have with Nikki, George and Helen. I must also add that I equally appreciate the interest and support that I have received from our previous Curator, Jeremy Knight.




BOOK RELEASE: NOTEWORTHY NATURE IN AND AROUND HORSHAM TOWN BY HEATHER GLENNY

She has published a book entitled 'Noteworthy Nature in and around Horsham town'. The aim of her book is to encourage anyone to go out and observe nature in their own garden, and at local sites.

This book covers her observations and gathered knowledge of sightings from her own garden, the Warnham Local Nature Reserve, Chesworth Farm, Green Spaces, and the wilding at the Knepp Estate. It also contains some sightings of insects from the Museum garden, with her photographs and some illustrations. It is now available from Waterstones Bookshop, Amazon, and from the Museum.



CRICKETER HARRY CHARLWOOD



It's been a busy summer of cricket with the England men and women having a good battle in the Ashes against their old rivals Australia.

But did you know a Horsham cricketer played in the first tour of Australia that included two Test matches?

Harry Charlwood, born in Horsham in 1846, was

a top-order batsman and occasional lob-bowler (underarm) for Sussex. His highest score for the county was 123 (1876).

Thanks to his county success, he was chosen for the James Lillywhite England tour of 1876/77 of Australia and New Zealand (which retrospectively was classified as the first Test cricket tour of Australia by an English team).

Charlwood scored 63 runs in the two matches against the Aussies but wasn't called on to bowl. Lillywhite's XI won both matches by an innings.

However, on returning to England Harry's first-class career faded somewhat.

Some reports put this down to him getting married which seems rather unfair!

He moved to Derbyshire and then Scarborough but the cricket success didn't follow him.

He eventually became a pub landlord and died, aged just 41, in 1888.

MUSEUM GARDEN UPDATE

My name is Mark Crane and I started volunteering in the Museum Garden in September 2022 having retired from a Career in finance spanning 44 years.

I have always had an interest in plants and gardens, this enthusiasm was encouraged in my early years by my grandfather who was himself a skilled gardener.

Within the Museum Garden I am the junior member, by length of service if not age! We all take guidance and direction from Heather, but we are given a good deal of flexibility on what we get involved with, I really enjoy the weekly sessions with the other garden volunteers.

I am approaching a full annual cycle of work. So far I have worked with Adrian clearing the flower bed at the end of the garden. This was somewhat overgrown with Ivy crowding out some of the existing plants. I have added some new plants to this area including the following specimens: Crinodendron, Trillium, Uvularia, Hamamelis. Sophie has also enhanced the bamboo display in this bed by removing some of the lower leaves on the stems.

I have utilised two old stone troughs that were unused and neglected, I have moved them into more prominent areas within the garden and planted them with alpines that I have sourced. I am planning on adding some protection as these plants will dislike being too wet during the winter.

As Heather referenced in the last newsletter, I am starting some work in the Courtyard area where the toilets are located. There is an absence of any plants in this area and the paving is being populated with invasive weeds and campanula.

We have replaced some plants that didn't survive the harsh weather last winter, I've divided up a Banana from home and that now seems to be growing well, I've brought in two agapanthus and two giant scabious as well. At the time of writing, the Ginger lilies are looking particularly good and the Rose 'Rhapsody in Blue' is having a fine second flush of flowers after Carole's dead heading earlier in the summer.

I've donated some Dianthus carthusianorum and a yellow Kniphofia to Adrian for the arid bed that he is developing, hopefully these will flower this year.

I would also like to correct a name on the last newsletter, Heather had introduced Sophie as Sophie Rose, her name is actually Sophie Kennett.

EXCURSION TO HAMPTON COURT - 16 AUGUST 1923

OCKLEY AND OAKWOOD HILL - 2 JULY 1923

Fifty four members of the Museum Society went to Hampton Court travelling by car. When they arrived they assembled under the colonnade where Mr S Mitchell read extracts from the paper he had prepared about the history of the palace. He compared the building by Cardinal Wolsey to the fairy tale of Aladdin, the next owner to Bluebeard and Oliver Cromwell to Jack the Giant Killer. The palace was thoroughly explored and the garden enjoyed, including the puzzle of the maze. The party then proceeded to Kingston for tea before returning home.



Also in 1923 the Society went by Mr Rayner's comfortable conveyance first to Ockley where a stop was made to view the church and Mr S Mitchell read a paper about the payments made from Parish Relief. The party then walked to the church at Oakwood by a footpath, made longer by the direct way being blocked by barbed wire! A bountiful tea was enjoyed at the Punch Bowle and Mr Mitchell read another paper about Oakwood and Stane Street. Miss Kennet remembered an earlier visit in 1915.

These two accounts are taken from reports in WSCT transcribed by Julie Mitchell.

Horsham Museum's Assistant Curator George Graham was the special guest on the very popular BBC daytime programme Bargain Hunt back in June.

For those who haven't seen it, the programme looks at a local topic during each episode between the contestants searching for antiques to put up for auction.

George was invited on to the show, filmed at Ardingly Showground back in February (hence some warm winter clothes!), to talk about Frederick DuCane Godman, an explorer and collector who lived just outside Horsham, in South Lodge.

Godman has been the subject of the Museum's summer exhibition which has proved very popular!

However, Bargain Hunt presenter Eric Knowles confessed, much to his dismay, he had never heard of the man despite the amazing collections Godman amassed during his lifetime (1834-1919) and was glad to be enlightened.

George brought some examples of moss that Godman had compiled, revealing the incredible detail the man put into every project.

THE SHELLEY MEMORIAL PROJECT

The Shelley Gallery in Horsham Museum opened on 7th April 2023 and has been a very popular new attraction for our summer visitors.

Percy Bysshe Shelley was born in Field Place in Warnham on 4th August 1792

He was the eldest son of Sir Timothy Shelley (1753-1844), a Whig Member of Parliament for Horsham from 1790 to 1792 and for Shoreham between 1806 and 1812, and his wife, Elizabeth Pilfold (1763-1846), the daughter of a successful butcher.[15] He had four younger sisters and one much younger brother.

A radical in his poetry as well as in his political and social views, Shelley did not achieve fame during his lifetime, but recognition of his achievements in poetry grew steadily following his death, and he became an important influence on subsequent generations of poets, including Robert Browning, Algernon Charles Swinburne, Thomas Hardy, and W. B. Yeats

On 1 July 1822, Shelley and Edward Williams sailed in Shelley's new boat the Don Juan to Livorno in Italy where Shelley met Leigh Hunt and Byron in order to make arrangements for a new journal, The Liberal. After the meeting, on 8 July, Shelley, Williams, and their boat boy sailed out of Livorno for Lerici. A few hours later, the Don Juan and its inexperienced crew were lost in a storm.

Shelley's badly decomposed body washed ashore at Viareggio ten days later and was identified from the clothing and a copy of Keats's poetry in a jacket pocket. On 16 August, his body was cremated on a beach near Viareggio and the ashes were buried in the Protestant Cemetery of Rome

The new Shelley Gallery showcases many original documents and artifacts from Shelley's early life in Horsham and his radical poetry.

His best-known works include Ozymandias, Ode to the West Wind, To a Sky-Lark (Hail to thee, Blythe Spirit), The Mask of Anarchy.

The Shelley Memorial Project is a community interest group from the town working to achieve a lasting public memorial to the locally born poet, Percy Bysshe Shelley. The SMP staged the Shelley200 Festival last year and various poetry events during 2023. The memorial will not only celebrate and commemorate Shelley and his works, but also provide literary, historical, and philosophical inspiration to Horsham residents and visitors. It will highlight the town's place on the country's cultural map and represent and inspire the talent within the community.

David Hide of SMP said: "Our aim is to commemorate Shelley's great art by means of a public artwork which we want to be a source of pride and inspiration to the Horsham community and a source of interest and enjoyment to visitors to the town. The Memorial will also celebrate Horsham's place in our national cultural heritage."

At the time of going to press, the SMP with HDC, has progressed to the point of selecting the four best submissions from artists, which will then proceed to a public vote. The chosen work will then be subject of final fundraising with a view to installation in Horsham Park, somewhere near the pond.

DR ANDREW HODGSON TALK ON PERCY BYSSHE SHELLEY

The little known story of Elizabeth Hitchener and her romantic friendship with local poet Percy Bysshe Shelley was the fascinating topic of the Friends' talk in July.

We had not one, but two distinguished speakers who entertained around 30 Friends and members of the public at the Wesley Hall in Horsham's London Road Methodist Church.

Drs Andrew Hodgson (Birmingham University) and Will Bowers (Queen Mary University London) are working on a project involving Shelley's letters that were the main source of inspiration for the talk.

Shelley (in his late teens) wrote to Elizabeth (ten years his elder) during 1811/12. She was a schoolmistress at Hurstpierpoint where a couple of the poet's cousins were educated and where the two had probably met.

Shelley's letters show the first stirrings of his poetry, and Dr Hodgson described his writing style as 'a whirring of ideas, always considering, always on the move'.

Where Shelley expounded on the nature of love and sought to forge an intense emotional bond with Elizabeth, she trod more cautiously and was more in control of her feelings. We were shown examples of the letters and how an A4 sheet of paper could be folded and used almost like a notebook, to include verse, notes and the letter itself.

It was pointed out that the Museum's current Shelley exhibition includes a book with copies of the Hitchener letters.

Interestingly, both Shelley and Elizabeth died in the same year, 1822, and while the former has become a world renowned figure, the latter has virtually been expunged from history.

This may have been due to her being the daughter of a pub landlord, with the resulting snobbery and disdain of her close but brief relationship with the poet.


Despite her role as a school founder and writing a couple of intriguing puzzle books of verse, Elizabeth Hitchener has remained something of a postscript to Shelley's life.

However, Drs Hodgson and Bowers look set to give her the credit she deserves as an integral part of the poet's life.


